SUBJECT: Report on Initial Certification Application Statuses

SUMMARY

A total of 68.8 percent of the applicants who passed the 2019 Legal Specialist Examination (LSX) have filed their initial certification application as of December 1, 2021. The remaining eligible applicants had until April 24, 2021 or request an extension of time.

BACKGROUND

To receive initial certification as a specialist, applicants must comply with a two-part process. Applicants must first pass the Legal Specialist Examination (LSX). Only then do they become eligible to file a post-examination application for initial certification documenting experience, education, and references, and they must do so within three years and three months of the original examination date.

Because examination results expire after that amount of time has lapsed, applicants who fail to file their initial certification applications by the extension deadline must take and pass the examination again in order to continue with their eligibility for certification.

DISCUSSION

2019 SUCCESSFUL EXAMINATION APPLICANTS

As of December 1, 2021, 263 of the 382 candidates who passed the 2019 LSX have filed their initial certification applications. Attachment A provides a breakdown of those candidates by

specialty area. Estate Planning, Trust & Probate Law and Family Law have received most of the initial certification applications from 2019 LSX eligible applicants, which also accounts for more than half of the total received applications.

Remaining candidates had until April 24, 2021 to submit their initial certification application, unless an extension of time to submit their application by January 31, 2023 is granted. Of the 119 candidates pending filing of the initial certification application, 43 have already requested and received an extension.

The most common reason for requesting an extension is to accumulate the minimum five years' time in practice required to become a certified specialist. Candidates can submit their applications before they meet the five-year time-in-practice requirement so that other portions of the application can be evaluated until that requirement is met.
