SUBJECT: Presentation on Preliminary Risk Assessment, Attorney Supervision & Assistance Redesign (ASAR) Project

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

As a key component of its Attorney Supervision & Assistance Redesign (ASAR) Project, the State Bar has retained data analytics experts, Dr. Michael Baglivio and Dr. Kevin Wolff, to design a risk assessment tool that can be used to inform the Office of Case Management & Supervision's monitoring of respondents with disciplinary conditions. This is an informational item to update the Regulation and Discipline Committee (RAD) on the progress of this project. Dr. Baglivio and Dr. Wolff will present an overview and their preliminary findings to RAD.

BACKGROUND

The purpose of the ASAR project is to reduce recidivism of attorneys in the discipline system and increase public protection by providing a framework for systems change to improve performance and rehabilitation for respondents under State Bar supervision. The project also aims to assist the State Bar Court by enforcing orders that will be more targeted to address the root causes of the misconduct that brought the respondent under State Bar supervision. ASAR was launched in the latter part of 2019, after data available at the time revealed a high rate of recidivism among respondent attorneys in the discipline system. There was a small percentage of attorneys in the discipline system, compared to the attorney population as a whole, but the same attorneys continued to reoffend. Recognizing that the State Bar needed to try a different approach, it retained a consultant with expertise in criminal justice reform to

assist in developing an updated approach to probation. As a first step, the Office of Probation was reorganized with the goal of reorienting the supervision of probationers using evidence-based practices, including more current, customized supervision techniques like those more recently developed in the criminal probation context. Currently, State Bar disciplinary conditions tend to be generic with the same standard conditions ordered for most respondents. Under the proposed new framework, the State Bar Office of Case Management & Supervision-Probation is working with the State Bar Court to develop a new set of conditions for respondents on probation. Additionally, Probation Case Specialists at the State Bar are undergoing training in assessing each respondent, and in motivational interviewing techniques to more precisely determine the appropriate interventions designed to increase the likelihood that respondents will successfully complete probation and hopefully avoid discipline in the future.

In furtherance of its purpose, ASAR's articulated vision statement provides:

When the project has been completed the system designed to manage supervision and support matters will, using evidenced-based and evidence-informed practices, provide the appropriate level of supervision and support to all disciplined attorneys, including those with substance use issues and behavioral health issues, to provide them tools to successfully comply with their disciplinary conditions, to reduce recidivism, and thereby enhance public protection.

One of the main tools that will be used to inform the monitoring of respondents is a risk assessment. A risk assessment is an algorithmic tool designed to predict the future risk for misconduct. These predictions inform decisions, such as appropriate programming and interventions while on probation. Risk assessments are designed to bring consistency, accuracy, and transparency to decisions and in turn will reduce recidivism.

Staff and our consultants have closely followed the literature warning of the potential dangers of utilizing algorithms for sentencing purposes in the criminal justice context—particularly as such tools may reinforce sentences issued in an already-biased system. It is very important to understand that the State Bar's risk assessment tool will not be used to impose harsher discipline. Instead, it is designing the risk assessment tool to act as a guide in directing resources to where they are most needed to both protect the public and rehabilitate attorneys. Intervening and providing service levels based on a risk profile may reduce bias in the decision-making process, and the risk assessment will be created with a focus on avoiding implicit bias. A tailored approach is likely to produce more desirable outcomes. Rather than the current, generic disciplinary conditions, the tool will ensure that probation conditions will be better designed to the needs of the respondent.

DISCUSSION

Risk assessments are implemented in the criminal justice setting to reduce recidivism and enhance the potential for success. Risk assessments are designed to assign levels of risk to the individual to inform the level and type of supervision and monitoring likely required. If research

in the criminal justice setting correlates to the State Bar respondent population, low risk respondents would require fewer interventions, while higher risk respondents would be more resource intensive.

Dr. Michael Baglivio and Dr. Kevin Wolff are analyzing relevant State Bar discipline data to determine if there are predictive factors that can be used to create a risk assessment tool. The objective data of the risk assessment would also be supplemented by dynamic factors and information obtained through the intake interview process.

Doctors Baglivio and Wolff were provided data on 2,548 unidentified and unidentifiable attorneys who were reprovved or placed on probation between December 31, 2009, and December 29, 2020.

The dataset also includes information as to demographics, charges, admission information, new complaints filed, additional discipline imposed, specific disciplinary conditions, and certain timelines, such as the time from admission to first complaint. It also includes a detailed breakdown of categories of disciplinary conditions that were ordered, for example, ethics school, restitution, etc.

Dr. Baglivio and Dr. Wolff are analyzing the information to determine if there are patterns or pieces of data that can be predictive in determining future risk of recidivism. Probation staff will design interventions, and where needed, make a motion to the State Bar Court to revise probation conditions to allow the use of interventions not initially ordered as part of the conditions of probation. Doctors Baglivio and Wolff will be presenting RAD preliminary information regarding their work on the risk assessment tool.
