SUBJECT: Report on 2021/2022–2024 Homelessness Prevention (HP 3 Formula and RFP)
Grant Spending and Services in 2021–2023

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The HP 3 Formula and RFP grants last 36–37 months. Grantees have now reported on their spending and services for two years. State Bar staff (staff) review grantees' spending and services reports to ensure they are on track to meet their deliverables and spend down awards by the end of the grant period, and staff provide technical assistance as needed. This memo summarizes that data for the Homelessness Prevention Funds Committee (Committee) meeting on May 20, 2024.

BACKGROUND

The Budget Act of 2021 allocated \$40 million and the Budget Acts of 2022 and 2023 each allocated an additional \$20 million for a total of \$80 million over three years for grants to provide homelessness prevention legal services. These appropriations use federal Coronavirus State Fiscal Recovery Funds. After administrative costs, 75 percent of these funds are for formula grants and 25 percent is for competitive grants to qualified legal services projects (QLSPs) and support centers.¹

In 2021, the LSTFC made 75 formula and 23 competitive grants using the expected \$80 million. The formula grants extend from December 1, 2021, to December 31, 2024 (37 months). The competitive grants extend from January 1, 2022, to December 31, 2024 (36 months). Grantees have now reported on their spending and some services through March 2024, or nine quarters of the grant. However, grantees reported services data for quarter nine on April 4, 2024, and expenditures data for quarter nine on April 26, 2024, after analysis for this report began. Therefore, this report analyzes data from quarters one through eight, or the first two years of the grant.

DISCUSSION

EXPENDITURES FOR YEARS ONE AND TWO

Originally, HP 3 grantees received one-third of their award each year. However, on December 4, 2023, the Committee approved reallocating \$3,096,644 in HP 3 funds. As a result of the HP 3 reallocation, some award amounts increased, and others decreased. To accurately assess grantees' progress, staff compared grantees' expenditures to two-thirds of the original grant award for grantees who did not participate in the HP 3 reallocation process, and two-thirds of the adjusted grant award for grantees who participated in the HP 3 reallocation. Together, grantees spent 88 percent (\$45,615,814) of two-thirds of their total grant allocation by the end of 2023.² This left 12 percent (\$6,270,174) unspent.³ Grantees spent more than 75 percent of two-thirds of their total grant allocations for 85 of the 98 awards. For 10 grants, they spent 50 to 75 percent. Three grants spent under 50 percent. Figure 1 plots each grantees' expenditures for years one and two.⁴

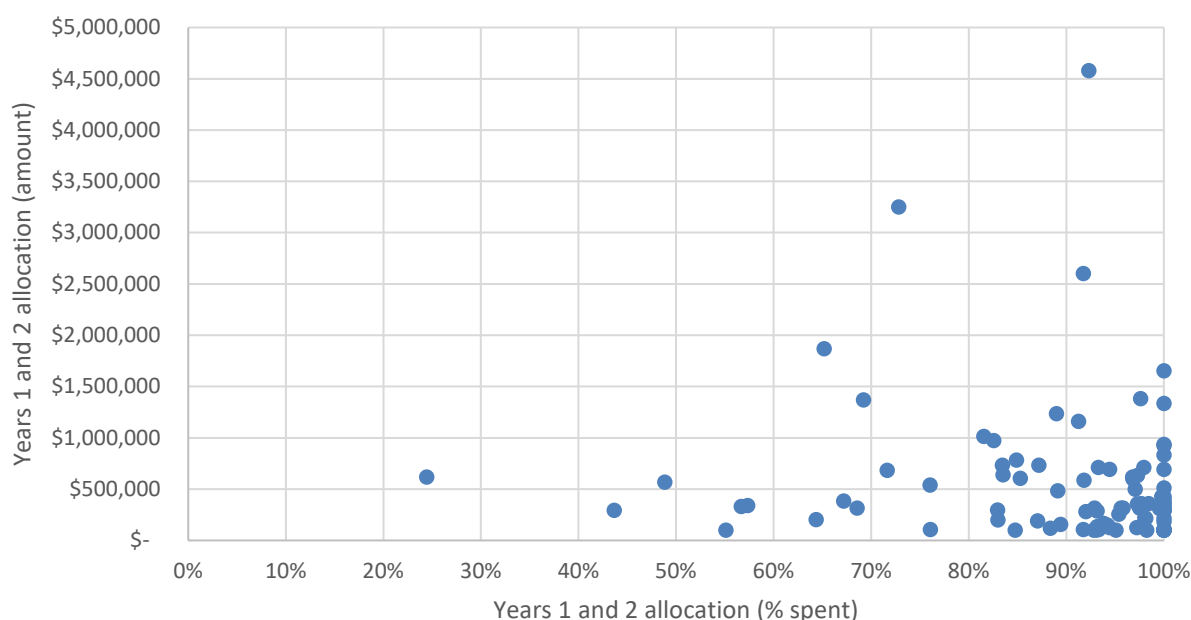

² Due to the HP 3 reallocation, two-thirds of the total grant allocation does not always match the original grant distribution amounts for years one and two for all grantees.

³ Total HP 3 spending during years one and two was actually \$700,463 higher (\$46,316,277). The difference is the amount that some programs reported spending in excess of their payment(s) for the first and second years. This memo excludes the \$700,463 when calculating statewide spend down for years one and two. That avoids masking the extent of underspending by other programs.

State Bar staff contacted programs about 13 awards that had spent less than 75 percent of the allocations for years one and two—adjusted for any reallocations—as of December 31, 2023. Staff evaluated these grantees’ explanations for reasonableness and provided technical assistance as appropriate. That support included advice on revising budgets. The most common reasons for underspending were staffing vacancies and lower demand for services.

SERVICES FOR YEARS ONE AND TWO

For all 98 grants, staff also performed quantitative and/or qualitative analyses to gauge progress against deliverables for years one and two. Quantitative analyses compared cases closed, self-help clinics, workshops/trainings, outreach events, and hotline calls against application targets. Qualitative analyses included asking programs about services that are harder to count (e.g., housing policy work) or missing in the quarterly reports (e.g., online tools for tenants and support center services).

The qualitative analysis was especially important for support centers, who have 18 of the 98 grants. The quarterly reports ask about common, client-facing work such as legal representation, clinics, and hotline calls. These tend to be the services on which QLSPs focus. While support centers may directly serve clients too, they mainly provide legal expertise and other support to QLSPs as part of the annual report.⁵ Staff evaluated both this quantitative data

⁵ On March 24, 2023, the LSTFC approved the collection of quantitative data about HP 2-, 3-, and 4-funded support center services to QLSPs. Support centers were required to collect and report this data beginning on January 1, 2023. Support centers were permitted to report this data for July 1, 2022, to December 31, 2022, to the extent that they were able. Therefore, this quantitative data is not available for all grantees for the entire period assessed in this report.

as well as qualitative data in order to determine if support centers were on track to meet their deliverable goals. In 2023, Support Centers reported the following services to QLSPs through June 30, 2023:

- 181 training events;
- 32 convenings; and
- 1,234 instances of research and technical assistance.⁶

HP 3 grantees reported closing 28,120 cases in the first eight quarters. These are matters creating an attorney-client relationship—including “counsel and advice-only” cases. Grantees also reported the following services not typically creating an attorney-client relationship:

- 464 self-help clinics (with 1,732 participants);
- 1,457 workshops and trainings (with 47,630 participants);
- 1,336 outreach events (with 51,731 participants); and
- 20,710 hotline calls.⁷

These totals may include returning clients. See Attachment B for services totals by grantee.

Assessing progress towards deliverables is subjective. Even measuring progress against numeric targets (e.g., 50 cases in year one) can understate a project’s impact. Nonetheless, staff endeavored to assess whether grants were at least 75 percent of the way towards their years one and two goals.

Staff contacted programs for at least 34 grants that it thought might be under target or about which it was unsure. Those programs have clarified or explained their progress. Staff reviewed all explanations for reasonableness and to provide technical assistance. Like for spenddown, common reasons for services delays were hiring challenges, staff turnover, and low demand for services. Additionally, some grantees reported that cases were more complex, longer, and required a deeper level of service than projected.

⁶ Since only the annual evaluations collect support center services data, this data is not yet available after June 30, 2023. Staff will collect this data for July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024, as part of this year’s annual evaluation.

⁷ Staff identified two minor errors in grantees’ HP 3 quarterly reports: Legal Access Alameda (LAA) mistakenly reported 42 self-help clinic attendees and zero self-help clinics for its HP 3 Formula grant. LAA should have also reported zero self-help clinic attendees. California Indian Legal Services (CILS) reported eight outreach event participants and zero outreach events but should have reported eight outreach events and 30 outreach event participants for its HP 3 RFP grant. The total services and attendees reported reflect these corrections. Staff provided both grantees with technical assistance and the grantees will correct these errors on the Quarter 10 services report. Staff will also note these revisions in the HP 3 Year 3 report it will submit to the Judicial Council later this year.

CONCLUSION

Grantees have provided reasonable explanations to account for discrepancies between their projected spending and services and their reported spending and services for the first two years of the HP 3 grant. State Bar staff will continue to provide technical assistance to programs who report underspending or lower deliverables, as well as to programs who request budget and/or deliverable modifications.

* This table focuses on legal aid to indigent Californians. While support centers often serve these clients directly, they typically do so by providing legal support to QLSPs. The table, therefore, understates the volume of SC work.

On March 24, 2023, the LSTFC approved the collection of quantitative data about HP 2-, 3-, and 4-funded support center services to QLSPs as part of the annual report. Support centers were required to collect and report this data beginning on January 1, 2023.

Support centers were able to report specific metrics for July 1, 2022, to December 31, 2022, to the extent that they were able. Although support center services to QLSPs are not captured in the quarterly reports, staff reviewed them in order to evaluate support centers' services. From July 1, 2022, to June 30, 2023, support centers reported the following services to QLSPs:

- **Trainings:** Support centers held 181 trainings for QLSPs, other community-based organizations (CBOs), and the public on a range of homelessness prevention law issues. Most trainings focused on housing law, but other areas of law included juvenile law, health and long-term care, and income maintenance, among others.
- **Convenings:** Support centers convened 32 meetings with QLSPs, CBOs, and government agencies to evaluate and guide developments in homelessness prevention law.
- **Research and technical assistance:** Support centers provided 1,234 instances of substantive law and project design (e.g., evaluation) consultation to QLSPs and community advocates.
- **Other activities:** Support centers participated in advocacy efforts, served on task forces, and provided comments on changes to laws related to homelessness prevention legal services.
